**PROPOSED IACS RESOLUTION ON THE
ETHICAL HANDLING OF CULTURAL HERITAGE**

During the past several years, members of the IACS Board have drafted, discussed, and revised a proposed resolution to be presented at the Twelfth International Congress of Coptic Studies. The current draft (dated 18 May 2022; see below) will be the topic of a plenary panel discussion on Wednesday morning, 13 July, 11:00–12:30, with Paola Buzzi (IACS President-Elect, serving as the panel's moderator), Caroline Schroeder (Board Member-at-Large), Maher A. Eissa, Alin Suciu, and Mourad Wahba (President of the Society of Coptic Archaeology, Cairo). The IACS President plans to present the resolution, which may be subject to further revision as a result of the public discussion on Wednesday, at the IACS Business Meeting on Saturday morning, 16 July, 10:00–12:00, for adoption by the IACS membership.¹ The current draft follows, omitting only two appendices containing lists of relevant Egyptian laws and international conventions with internet addresses where the items listed can be consulted. Copies of the complete current draft, including the appendices, will be made available during the Congress to anyone who wants one.

IACS Resolution on the Ethical Handling of Cultural Heritage

Provisional draft proposal, adopted on 18 May 2022 by the IACS Board
(with 6 votes in favor, 3 opposed, 1 abstention) for discussion by a panel
during the Twelfth International Congress of Coptic Studies.

1. The International Association for Coptic Studies (IACS) asserts the necessity of preserving and studying material cultural heritage as a central and essential aspect of Coptic studies. For the purposes of this resolution, material cultural heritage may be understood broadly, in the sense of “archaeological heritage,” as comprising all

remains, objects, artefacts, and other traces of humankind studied by members of the IACS and created at least a century before the present day wherever they may be situated, in accordance with Egyptian law no. 117 of 1983 on the protection of antiquities, as amended by law no. 3 of 2010 (compare the European Convention on the Protection of the Archaeological Heritage, 1992, art. 1). Members of the IACS should follow an ethical approach to material cultural heritage in their academic practice, including the respectful treatment of human remains.

2. Knowledge of the archaeological provenience and subsequent provenance of any artefact is essential to scientific historical research. When an antiquity is removed from its archaeological context without proper documentation, the cultural heritage is damaged, and current and future scholars are prevented from properly understanding the object and its original context. The looting and trafficking of antiquities of all sorts has had deleterious effects both on scientific research and on the heritage communities themselves. The threats posed to cultural heritage by looting and trafficking are not confined to the historical past but continue in the present, now enhanced by the manifold possibilities offered by online communication and commerce. The continued trafficking of previously looted or illegally acquired antiquities fuels the illegal markets, contributes to the demand for looted artefacts, and prevents such artefacts from becoming available for professional conservation, research, and publication. Such activities violate both Egyptian laws and international conventions. Members of the IACS have an obligation to inform colleagues, students, junior researchers, and the public about the provenance of the antiquities they study or curate, in order to enhance awareness that there is a difference between the legitimate study of cultural heritage and scholarship that relies on illicit trade in looted archaeological artefacts.

3. As a matter of principle, the IACS is resolved to avoid contributing in any way, whether directly or indirectly, to the illicit handling of antiquities. Among various ways that this resolve can be expressed and acted upon is a commitment to a heightened awareness of the ethical and legal significance of any material cultural object's provenance, that is, the history of the object's discovery and subsequent ownership up to its arrival at its current location. Any antiquity that was removed from its country of origin other than in accordance with the laws of that country, other relevant laws, and pertinent international conventions may be said to have been illegally sourced and trafficked. For any antiquity that is now outside of its country of origin and whose legal removal cannot be documented, or at least inferred, there exists the possibility that it was sourced and trafficked illegally. To evaluate an antiquity's status in this regard, it is necessary both to establish the object's provenience and provenance so far as possible and to know the history of Egyptian law pertaining to antiquities going back to the mid-nineteenth century (see the resources listed in the Appendices). Scholars who are studying antiquities should at least be aware of any controversial or potentially controversial aspects of the objects' provenance. "Sci-

tific authentication” is not necessarily equivalent to or substitutable for the demonstration of licit provenance.

4. Of greatest concern at the present time is the ongoing illegal excavation, exportation, and illicit trafficking of Egyptian antiquities, to which the IACS is fundamentally opposed. In this regard, the IACS is resolved that its members should not participate directly in the buying or selling of antiquities whose provenance is unrecorded or poorly documented. They should not take any action that may directly or indirectly increase the commercial value of such artefacts that are in circulation or encourage further looting of, or illicit trading in, antiquities. Members should not participate in the identification, assessment, valuation, authentication, documentation, cataloguing, or publication of artefacts whose provenance cannot be confirmed to be in accordance with law and international conventions. Members should be cautious even in discussing such objects in online fora, including social media. Such actions are particularly to be avoided in the case of artefacts associated with dealers who are known to traffic in undocumented antiquities from Egypt. Such participation is only acceptable if requested by a law enforcement or government agency, or if it forms part of research on the antiquities trade itself as per point 7 below.

5. Members of the IACS should promote transparency in the collection of antiquities by not presenting at professional meetings or publishing in professional journals undocumented antiquities in private collections whose owners, or those operating on their behalf, request anonymity or non-disclosure agreements; in general, members should not grant anonymity to the owners of private collections except in exceptional circumstances, which must be justified in the presentation, poster, or publication. Members should consider reporting suspicious artefacts to the appropriate authorities. Forgeries or objects suspected of being forgeries may be published if their provenance is discussed as far as is known and the publication is being used to highlight the issue of forged objects.

6. With regard to Coptic antiquities that are already permanently housed in public institutions, or in institutions that have a responsibility to the public, the IACS is resolved that its members should exercise due and proper diligence regarding provenance and collection histories. Antiquities now in foreign collections should not be studied, presented, or published if they are not clearly documented as having been outside of Egypt before 1983, even if they have been the subject of prior scholarly publications. In general, members of the IACS should privilege work with provenanced antiquities in public museums and libraries and dedicated charitable and nonprofit educational and cultural heritage institutions, rather than undocumented antiquities in private collections.

7. With regard to its own periodic publications, namely the *Journal of Coptic Studies*, the Newsletter of the IACS, and Acts or Proceedings of its International Congresses of Coptic Studies, the IACS is resolved that they should not be used for the publication or announcement of antiquities whose status of ownership is not in

accordance with Egyptian laws and international conventions and laws. Such items may be discussed, however, only if a primary purpose of the presentation, poster, or publication is to highlight and comment on issues relating to the looting, dispersal, or trafficking of Egypt's cultural heritage.

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NEW NAME FOR ST. MARK'S COPTIC MUSEUM:
THE COPTIC MUSEUM OF CANADA

Founded in 1996, St. Mark's Coptic Museum in Scarborough (a section of Toronto), Canada, was given this name because of its association with St. Mark's Coptic Orthodox Church in Scarborough. The Coptic community has since then grown across Canada and indeed North America. The Museum's outreach activities have responded to this growth, and the Museum is now recognized as a Canadian cultural institution respected for its vital role in preserving and researching its unique collection and in communicating the rich cultural heritage of the Copts. The museum's name needed to reflect this growth and evolution, and so in September 2018 the Museum's Board of Directors renamed it as the Coptic Museum of Canada / Musée copte du Canada. MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-SECOND IACS BOARD MEETING
BRUSSELS, 28 JULY 2018

Present: David BRAKKE (President), Heike BEHLMER (President-Elect), Stephen EMMEL (Secretary), Tito ORLANDI (Webmaster, via Skype), Alain DELATTRE (Congress Secretary) Anne BOUD'HORS (Editor, *JCoptS*), Paola BUZI (via Skype), Elisabeth R. O'CONNELL. Guest (for the organizing committee of ICCopts 12): Naïm Vanthieghem. Excused: Malcolm CHOAT, Peter GROSSMANN (Director, Cairo Center), Caroline T. SCHROEDER.

The President convened the meeting at 10:20.

1. The agenda for the Board Meeting was altered such as to divide point 2 into three sub-parts, as recorded below; to add points 8, 9, and 10, as recorded below; and so to renumber point 8 "Other business" as point 11, as recorded below.
- 2.a. The Congress Secretary together with Naïm Vanthieghem, as a member of the congress organizing committee in Brussels, reported in detail on the preparations for

the Twelfth International Congress of Coptic Studies to be held at the Université libre de Bruxelles (Brussels, Belgium), 13–18 July 2020.²

The Congress program will include twelve plenary papers,³ as follows:

Papers in parallel sessions will be given 30-minute slots (20 min. + 10 min. of discussion). Pre-organized panels and workshops will be welcome. A plenary session on Wednesday morning (11:00–12:30) will be devoted to reports on projects and/or digital humanities, perhaps also issues of cultural heritage policy. On Wednesday afternoon, there will be an organized visit for all Congress participants to the Musées Royaux d'Art et d'Histoire. The Congress will close on Saturday morning with the quadrennial Business Meeting of the IACS.

Other details that were presented to and discussed by the Board included: schedule of announcements and call for papers, Congress participation fees, budget, publication of the proceedings (including questions of “open access”), Congress website, and publishers’ book displays.

2.b. Paola BUZI, speaking also for Malcolm CHOAT, Elisabeth O’CONNELL, and Caroline T. SCHROEDER, took up the question of “cultural heritage policy” (see Minutes of the 30th Board Meeting, point 14; Minutes of the 31st Board Meeting, point 5) as a topic for discussion at the upcoming Congress. A draft statement concerning this topic will be submitted to the IACS Board and other specialists in fall 2019, with a view to making revisions and preparing a version for circulation to IACS members for discussion during the Congress (for example as a panel, or during the special plenary session on Wednesday morning; see point 2.a above). The outcome of this undertaking might be a motion to adopt a version of such a statement as an official position taken and held by the IACS.

2.c. Paola BUZI raised for discussion the general question of the structure IACS Congresses in the future, noting *inter alia* that large congresses are becoming increasingly expensive, but at the same time less effective at achieving their intended purpose; that participants have become increasingly disinclined to publish their Congress papers in the volume of Congress proceedings; that the IACS Congresses' quadrennial plenary research reports could be differently conceived in order to be more immediately useful for the development of Coptic studies. After discussion, it was agreed that concrete proposals should be circulated in advance of the next Board Meeting. The President offered to draft a written survey questionnaire that could be circulated at the Congress to elicit opinions and ideas about the structure of future IACS Congresses.

3. The Secretary reported on the IACS's continued financial health as well as the strength of its membership, still above 300 in number. He apologized again for being behind in the publication of the *Newsletter* etc.

4. The Secretary reported on his knowledge of the status of the preparation of the Acts from the previous IACS Congress (*ICCoptS 11 [Claremont 2016]*), being edited by Hany N. Takla and Maged S. A. Mikhail, with the assistance of the IACS Secretary.

5. For reasons of health, the President-Elect has found it necessary to submit her resignation from the Board of the IACS. After discussion, the resignation was accepted, to become effective at the end of the present Board Meeting. The Secretary read from the IACS Statutes §5 that "the Board will have the right in the case of a vacancy to elect a replacement to serve until the next Business Meeting." The Board agreed to deliberate via email during the coming months regarding a choice for a replacement President-Elect to serve until the 12th Business Meeting in July 2020. [Addendum: In November 2018 the Board duly elected Paola BUZI to replace Heike BEHLMER as President-Elect of the IACS, effective immediately; in April 2019 the Board duly elected Janet A. TIMBIE to replace Paola BUZI as IACS Board Member at Large, effective immediately, to serve in that position only until the IACS Business Meeting in summer 2022.]

6. The Board discussed several organizational aspects of the competition for the IACS Awards for Academic Excellence to be presented at the next Congress.⁴

7. With regard to the Thirteenth International Congress of Coptic Studies to be held in 2024,⁵ the Board is aware of the need to choose from several existing proposals. The President proposed that he should inquire about the current status of the matter, so that the Board can make its decision during 2019.

8. On the topic of the IACS's former electronic mailing list called COPTIST, the Webmaster reiterated his readiness to create a "Google Group" as an experimental replacement for the former list, which had been hosted by a server at the University of Rome. After discussion, the Board agreed and encouraged the Webmaster to take the necessary steps.

9. The Webmaster raised the question of the status of the IACS's Cairo Center at the Société d'archéologie copte (SAC). After discussion, including a brief review by the Secretary of the events and discussions that led to the creation of the Cairo Center after the First International Congress of Coptology in Cairo in 1976, it was agreed that the *raison d'être* for its existence has ceased to be clear. An international conference to be held in Wadi Natrun in February 2019, which will be attended by several members of the IACS Board, might provide an opportunity for a fact-finding visit to the SAC in Cairo.

10. The President-Elect reported the fact that a number of members have expressed dissatisfaction with the IACS's procedure for nominating a new Board at its Business Meetings. She thought that better advertising of the nominating process before the beginning of each Congress might serve to alleviate members' concerns. The Secretary noted that the IACS's nominations procedure is clearly regulated by the IACS Statutes (§5) and does not explicitly entail any participation by IACS members who are not also members of the outgoing Board (as specified in the Statutes). But he drew attention also to §9 of the Statutes, which states that "the Statutes may be revised by a majority vote at a Business Meeting. Proposals for changes in the Statutes must be submitted in writing to the Secretary, who will publish them in the Newsletter before the Business Meeting at which they are to be considered."

11. Other business. There was no other business.

The President adjourned the meeting at 13:20.
